Tony was born in Cambridge, his parents were Margaret and Quentin Lawrence. Quentin was a famous film and television director. As Tony grew up in the world of show biz he was accustomed to meeting famous celebrities, like Cleo Laine, the famous jazz singer, who was his Godmother. There were many other famous people in his family circle.

From 1969 to 1970 Tony attended St. Martins School of Art in London. This was followed by Ruskin School of drawing and fine art at Oxford University before graduating in 1974. Tony became a highly acclaimed artist painting, amongst others, portraits of the Irish Poet Seamus Heaney, Lord Yehudi Menuhin, actor Sir Ian McKellan and



fellow artist Francis Bacon. He was a highly respected artist and known worldwide.

Tony and his family moved to Milford in 1977 and then to Tiptoe in 2002.

Tony's family intend to keep the account @anthonylawrenceart going and is organising a major retrospective of his paintings.

Tony's wife Lesley said that the family will miss him dearly. He leaves his wife Lesley, their 5 children and one grandson.



HMS Tiptoe, our film star namesake.

HMS Tiptoe was a Second World War British submarine. Unusually she was actually named by Winston Churchill personally, who thought the name would reflect that the submarine could approach the enemy silently – but the Royal Navy naming committee was far from keen seeing the name as "derogatory to one of His Majesty's ships". Nevertheless, Churchill got his way.




Built in Barrow HMS Tiptoe was launched in 1944 and set out to the far east. arriving in Trincomalee. Ceylon for her first posting in March 1945. Before the end of the war, she had served in the Flores Sea and Sunda Strait. sinkina several Japanese cargo ships and coasters but also suffering a depth charge attack which




damaged her sonar and torpedo tubes.

After the war she returned to the home fleet and in 1950 was used in the filming of "Morning Departure" – a drama about the crew of a stricken

submarine, the HMS Trojan, with a cast that included John Mills, Kenneth More and Richard Attenborough. This was not her only link with the movie industry as later on Moira Shearer presented HMS Tiptoe with the ballet shoes she had worn in "The Red Shoes" as the badge of the Tiptoe was of a ballet dancer.





These glamorous highlights of HMS Tiptoe's career were followed by less auspicious incidents. In 1964 her commanding officer was reprimanded following Tiptoe running aground in the Firth of Clyde, and her next commanding officer was also reprimanded in 1965 following a collision with HMS Yarmouth.

HMS Tiptoe's departure on her final commission in February 1967 was attended by dancers from the Royal Ballet and in 1969, as she arrived at Spithead for decommissioning, a ballet dancer danced on her upper deck.

Sold in 1971, HMS Tiptoe was finally broken up in 1975. But HMS Tiptoe has not entirely gone, the anchor survives and sits of the quayside in Blyth, Northumberland. Moira Shearer's ballet shoes are now in the possession of the Royal Navy Submarine Museum in Gosport, as is a lifebuoy from HMS Tiptoe that was found washed up on the Isle of Wight. *Jon Linin*

From the Tiptoe School Governors - Spring 2023

Hello my name is Janine Adams and I am the Chair of Governors at Tiptoe Primary School and also a local resident! I thought it might be useful to give you some insight into what we do.

Have you ever wondered what a School Governor does?

Well, School Governors are responsible for overseeing the management side of a school: strategy, policy, budgeting, and staffing. They should help their school to run as effectively as possible, working alongside senior leaders and supporting teachers to provide excellent education to children.

At Tiptoe, I think we have a great team of governors who come from various backgrounds and possess differing skills. We aim to use those skills to support the Headteacher and staff to drive the school forward.

We are a friendly bunch and you may have guessed what is coming next..... We have a vacancy

Who are we looking for?

We are looking for a volunteer with good inter-personal skills and the ability to work as part of a team. You would be committed to improving our children's future and educational outcomes. It is often useful if you have wider experience to support the board - such as Finance, Legal, HR, Education, IT, Health and Safety, or Project management - but your enthusiasm for the role is the most important attribute.

What difference will you make?

You would perform the most important voluntary role in education and a full and diverse governing body can be a source of enormous strength to a school. You can provide an external perspective and an ability to challenge assumptions and look for the best solutions. You bring enthusiasm, experience, and expertise from other areas of life and can act together as a well-balanced group of people to support the school

What's in it for me?

Volunteering as a governor is a great way to contribute to the local community, meet new people and improve the lives of the children at Tiptoe School. You can develop transferable skills and learn more about the education system whilst putting existing skills and experience to good use.

What's the time commitment?

Governors are asked to attend 3 two-hour Full Governing Body meetings and 3 one-hour committee meetings per academic year. These are normally held on Wednesday between 4pm-6pm.

In addition to this, each Governor is asked to visit the school a few times a year for a focused visit. We appreciate that everyone has different commitments but on average the time commitments is 50 - 60 hours per academic year.

VASLR update February 2023

The Parish Council's VASLR (Vehicle Activated Speed Laser Recording) device has been deployed to several locations around Tiptoe over the past 18 months. The VASLR records the speed of incoming traffic and flashing a warning if the speed limit is exceeded. The VASLR also captures the speeds of vehicles travelling in the opposite direction (who don't realise they are being surveyed). The VASLR does not record registration plates or speeding vehicles, but it does act as warning to speeding drivers. The information it records is sent to the Police Safer Road Team and will be used to inform possible new locations for the Speedwatch group, which is being relaunched and which does capture registrations of speeding vehicles (although we must caveat this, as all locations have to be approved by the police to ensure the safety of the volunteers).



The locations of the VASLR are: Tiptoe Green, Wootton Road near Broadley Farm and opposite Blue Cedars on Wootton Road, with the VASLR in position for approximately 3 weeks at each point. It recorded an average of 30,000 vehicles at each location. It was noticeable that recorded speeds were higher for cars approaching the rear of the VASLR, whose drivers did realise they were being surveyed.

The Tiptoe Green location recorded that 82% of cars were travelling at or under the speed limit and that the average speed here was 25mph. The Blue Cedar location at the southern end of Wootton Road recorded that 83% of cars were at or under the speed limit and the average speed was 27mph.

The Broadley Farm location was surveyed between June and August last year when the VASLR was pointed in both directions on the road. When it was pointed southwards, to flash at cars travelling towards Bashley, 65% of cars were travelling under the 30mph speed limit. When it was positioned to flash at cars travelling towards Tiptoe, only 39% were travelling at or under the speed

limit (the highest speed recorded here was 78mph at 10.30am!). However, the average speed of vehicles in both directions was 30mph, which is encouraging. As expected, the fasted speeds occurred in the early mornings or later at night.

The Speedwatch group currently has agreed locations at Middle Road, Wootton Road and Tiptoe Road in the village and is still looking for volunteers. Why did I become a Volunteer Driver for Hordle Volunteer Driver Group?

After retiring I felt it would be a good to get involved in the local community, as my occupation kept me away from the village a lot of the time so I was unable to commit the time before retirement.

As I like driving & meeting people, a friend who was already a Volunteer Driver suggested I should try it. Over 10 years later I am still a Volunteer Driver & still enjoying it!

Drivers like me have a responsibility to ourselves and our clients when in our care and car. We all have a DBS check and certificate which shows a check has been made on the individual driver for outstanding convictions or concerns from the police. We also visit clients to make sure we understand what they need in terms of support and what mobility aids they have so we can match the driver and car to the client's needs.

I keep volunteering to drive because I meet some very interesting people. To go to Bournemouth or Southampton takes maybe an hour. To sit in a car with a complete stranger would be a trauma (for me & the client) if I or the client did not say anything. So, often very interesting conversations ensue. They like to tell me things about their life and I bore them with tales of my life and career. We never ask the reasons why they are using the service. If they want to tell me the reasons, that's ok, but it stays in the car!!

The volunteer drivers' service is a huge benefit to the local community, for the client to have transport to a destination - hospital, doctor, dentist or chiropodist etc. and know that generally we wait to transport them back home, is a great comfort to them. Hospital public transport, if available, has to carry a number of passengers so the journey can sometimes be quite long and clients often need a bit of support getting in and out and finding the correct department.

I do enjoy taking you ladies & gentlemen to your appointments & am happy to be able to take part in such a worthwhile local charity. In addition it keeps me off the streets!!! Long may I be able to do it.

The Trustees of Tiptoe Green would like to remind both residents and visitors to the village of the requirement for dogs to be kept on a lead when on the village green.





Hordle Voluntary Drivers

There are few things in life more angst-making than feeling poorly or worried about our health. Having no means to get to and from medical appointments without a great deal of expense or hours of hanging round for buses and trains makes everything so much worse.

It's not just hospital appointments that pose problems for the elderly, infirm or injured; its trips to opticians, dentists, chiropodists, physiotherapists and so on. They are often short distances but expensive in taxis and especially difficult for those who are easily confused or have impaired mobility.

Since being appointed Chairman of the Hordle Volunteer Drivers Group I have become acutely aware of the wide variety of needs catered for by our amazing drivers. They are ordinary people who, for a variety of reasons, devote time to providing comfortable, reliable, and timely transport for a large group of vulnerable and infirm clients. Our drivers take the client to their appointments, wait for them to finish and take them home again. Sometimes this is an hour, two hours and sometimes longer. They are given expenses to cover fuel and wear and tear but not wages.

Last year we took over 170 clients to 735 appointments with about 10 active drivers - I'll let those numbers sink in a moment. I am often asked why we don't publicise our service more but as you can see, for more trips we need more drivers.

My challenge is going to be finding enough drivers to provide a safe and reliable service to everyone who needs it - no one told me it would be easy!

If you are active, enjoy driving and have some time to spare we can promise you a very rewarding experience and the opportunity to meet a wide variety of interesting people. You are not tied and can decide whether to accept a job when they come up. Parish Council Update – Spring 2023

Heritage Assets in Tiptoe named

The National Park Authority has named Tiptoe School, the River of Life Church and St Andrews as Heritage Assets on its Local List. According to the NPA this will "recognise the positive role buildings, structures, sites, monuments and other features play in reinforcing local character and the distinctiveness of areas...inclusion on the Local List does not add any further controls that already apply to a building or site. It simply changes the level of consideration given to preserving its character and appearance if/when future planning applications are submitted to the Authority for development. Having an up-to-date Local List enables the architectural or historic interest of these buildings to be considered properly as part of the assessment of any future development proposals submitted to the Authority."

Elections - 4th May: Save the date! This year is election year and Parish Councillors will be up for reelection. There is also one vacancy on the Parish Council at the time of writing. If you would like to make a real contribution to our community, why not consider putting yourself forward to become a Councillor? The deadline for nominations is 4pm on Tuesday 4th April. In addition, the polling station in Tiptoe will change venue to the River of Life Church.

Mineral Extraction at Yeatton Farm, Hordle

The Parish Council lodged a comprehensive objection to the proposals in Hampshire County Council's Mineral and Waste Plan Update for new gravel and sand extraction at Yeatton Farm, Hordle. Bees on the Green - Spring 2023

Early February and the frosts have returned with clear blue skies and a daytime temperature of 7. To the beekeepers delight, bees can be seen visiting early flowering shrubs such as Winter Honeysuckle, Winter Flowering Cherry, Snowdrops and Hellebores. At the hive entrance one can observe the returning bees loaded with pollen, the colour of which is a good indicator of the plants they have visited. Alongside the garden shrubs, the Hazel and Alder catkins are shedding pollen and, although these trees are wind pollinated, they are a valuable pollen resource. The pollen protein is essential at this time of year as the queen is now starting to lay eggs. The resultant bees will begin to emerge in 21 days' time to take their place within the expanding colony, building a foraging force to take advantage of the spring nectar flow and, for the



beekeeper, the prospect of a spring harvest. During February and March, one has to keep a close watch on the level of stores within the hive. As the queen increases the rate of egg laying, so too does the demand for carbohydrates in the form of honey to create beebread to feed the increasing brood.

As we face the demand for more land to provide for housing and gravel extraction with the resultant loss of floral resources, this in turn impacts on the long-term survivability of pollinators. There is some evidence to suggest that managed and introduced honeybees may have a negative effect on wild bees. Honeybees are unique in that they form large perennial colonies with a highly effective communication system; they are also generalist foragers with a large range of about 5km. These characteristics enable them to be highly adaptable and to aggressively exploit flowers – contributing to their success around the world. By contrast, other bee species form small colonies or are solitary; they can have a much smaller range, perhaps a few hundred metres, and are often more particular in their foraging requirement. Although honeybees, due to their relative short tongues are unable to access all flower types, where there is an overlap in forage with other pollinators (oil seed rape and field beans), the potential for competition is very high. There is also a risk that native plants with specialist flowers may not seed if their specific pollinator is no longer present.

However, we do need to be honest with ourselves and acknowledge that while beekeeping is a lovely and rewarding hobby, it does not contribute to nature conservation.

Some questions for beekeepers and the community at large.

Could we manage a smaller number of colonies really well?

Could we plant herbs and flowers to provide a continuous floral display throughout the season to maximise pollinator abundance and diversity?

Can we leave lawns uncut and other parts of our gardens untended to provide floral resources and nesting sites?

Honeybees are faithful pollinators and tend to forage a large area of the same type of flower. Could we aim to establish swathes of identical flowers throughout the year? It's worth recognising that honeybees evolved to live in woodland. In consideration of achieving a sustainable level of nectar and pollen to support a host of pollinators including honeybees, the planting of trees may be the best long-term solution. An example being a single Lime tree can provide as much forage as a 3000m² wildflower meadow. Not

only do trees provide a dense floral resource they have the added benefit of supporting an entire ecosystem.

The keeping of honeybees can be traced back millennia. This year marks the 400th anniversary of the publication of the second edition of the landmark book The Feminine Monarchie by the Rev. Charles Butler. The first edition was published in 1609, however the second edition published in 1623 had a significant impact, such that today the Rev. Butler is considered to be the father of English beekeeping. What was so special about the book was that it was the first full length instructional English-language book about beekeeping and remained a valid guide for two and a half centuries. The official celebration at Butler's Wootton St Lawrence Church near Basingstoke on the 19-20th of August this year is well worth a visit, and will feature aspects of Butler's life and work and what has happened across the four centuries since its publication. A 1623 second edition is currently being offered at little under £8,000.

Most honey on sale in supermarkets is a blend of honey from across the world, the British Beekeepers Association has petitioned the government



requiring that **honey labels include all countries of origin**, you can sign the petition at petition.parliament.uk/petitions/624402

Whilst on the question of honey labelling, you may have come across people offering "Raw Honey" for sale, a term much debated in the beekeeping community. Honey offered for sale in England is subject to The Honey (England) Regulations 2015. Honey is legally defined in those regulations and must be called by that name. The name "Honey" is a "reserved description". The regulations contain nine specific terms that can be used in describing honey, and definitions of what is meant. These too are all reserved descriptions. Raw is not on the list. The use of the word "raw" implies properties above and beyond "honey". Therefore, raw honey has no special characteristics and the term becomes misleading.

A US based company has developed a vegan alternative to honey. The product is made with sugars and plant extracts and is reported to be nutritionally similar to honey. It is expected to arrive on the European market early this year. It will be interesting to see how this product is marketed, given the existing regulations regarding what can and cannot be called "honey".

And finally, it's the time of year when overwintering Asian Hornet queens will begin to emerge, given that in the past nests have been found in New Milton, Highcliffe and Beaulieu, I would urge your continued vigilance. Further information can be found on the Asian Hornet Watch UK Centre for Ecology and Hydrology.

Animal Accidents on New Forest Roads - Report for 2022 Released

Figures released by the New Forest Verderers reveal that the number of animals killed or injured on roads through the Forest continued to fall last year as a result of a series of spot checks and driver education events that took place at key accident hot spots.

The total number of New Forest animals killed or injured and destroyed was 41 compared to 44 in 2021. This includes 34 ponies, 3 pigs, 2 cows and 2 donkeys. A further 19 animals were injured compared to 15 last year. Overall, Agisters attended 82 incidents, compared with 103 in 2021. 26 of these incidents happened in daylight, 13 in twilight and 43 in the dark.

Despite the numbers being lower, the multi-agency Animal Accident Reduction Group is still concerned about the overall number of accidents, with 12 of these being Hit and Runs.

Major phase of the Restoration of Hatchet Pond

The relocation of the car park at Hatchet Pond, one of the UK's most important ponds for nature, began on 23 January with the location and nearby Hawkhill car park both closed until late Spring. The works are part of an ongoing action plan by Forestry England, Freshwater Habitats Trust and Natural England to restore the renowned beauty spot which has been under major threat from pollution and over-use.

Hatchet Pond is the New Forest's largest body of fresh water and home to some of the rarest wetland plants and freshwater animals long since lost from many other parts of the UK. As the most wildlife rich pond remaining in lowland England, it has the highest possible conservation status as both a Site of Special Scientific Interest and a Special Area for Conservation and maintaining the health of the pond is a legal requirement.

Its restoration began in 2019 after analysis showed that the health of the water, and plants and wildlife that rely on it, were in severe decline. Actions already taken to improve the water quality include the removal of the toilet block which risked flooding into the pond, improved drainage to help prevent run off from the car park flowing into the pond, the removal of non-native carp, and increased signage highlighting actions the public can take to protect the Pond when visiting.

The next key phase of the restoration plan will take place this spring with the relocation of the car park to prevent pollution draining from it into the Pond. The approved planning permission will see the car park moved further away from the edge of the Pond whilst still retaining views over it.

Given the ecological importance of the site the works will be carried out by specialist contractors, overseen by Forestry England's ecology team, and take several months to complete.


